The United States of America (U.S.A.) consists of 50 states and the District of Columbia (D.C.). The U.S.A. has two neighbors on the continent of North America –



Canada in the north, and Mexico in the south. The land area of the United States covers more than 9,8 million square kilometers (3,8 million square miles), making it the fourth largest country in the world.

The U.S.A. has a population of almost 330 million people (2019 estimate). English is the official language, but Spanish is also widely spoken in states like California and Florida.

Washington, D.C. is the capital of the United States. Thousands of tourists visit the U.S.A. every year, and most of them visit one or

more of the big cities, like New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Miami and Chicago. Other famous tourist attractions include the Grand Canyon in Arizona, and Disneyland in California.

Since the middle of the 19th century, the United States has been a popular destination for millions of immigrants from around the world. These people have brought with them their own customs, languages, religions, and cuisine. Many of these immigrants have settled in cities like New York and San Francisco, making these cities some of the most culturally diverse in the world.
